

July 15, 2021: Andrew Bacevich, Quincy Institute After the Apocalypse: America's Role in a World Transformed



Dr. Andrew Bacevich discusses his highly acclaimed book *After the Apocalypse* (Metropolitan Books, 2021), in which he offers a bold and urgent perspective on America's place in the world. Confronting the threats of the future—accelerating climate change, a shift in the international balance of power, the ascendence of information technology over brute weapons of war—his vision calls for a profound overhaul of our understanding of national security.

Andrew Bacevich is the founder and president of the Quincy Institute for Responsible Statecraft, a bipartisan Washington think tank dedicated to foreign policy. He is Professor Emeritus of International Relations and History at the Boston University Frederick S. Pardee School of Global Studies. He holds a PhD in American Diplomatic History from Princeton University, and is also a retired career officer in the Armor Branch of the US Army. Dr. Bacevich is the author of *The Limits of Power*, *Washington Rules*, and *The Age of Illusions: How America Squandered its Cold War Victory*.

July 30, 2021: Victor G. Rodwin, New York University Lessons for Americans? A Comparative Analysis of Health Systems Abroad

Revamping the US healthcare system—the Affordable Care Act and public health in particular—will be a priority of the Biden administration. Can looking abroad inform policy debates at home? Dr. Victor Rodwin, who has devoted his career to studying health care systems abroad, discusses how other countries have succeeded in spending less than the United States while providing more effective health care to their citizens.

Victor Rodwin is Professor Emeritus of Health Policy and Management at the Wagner School of Public Service at New York University (NYU), and Co-Director of the World Cities Project, which focuses on urban aging, emergency preparedness, and the health care systems in New York, London, Paris, Tokyo, and Hong Kong. Before joining the faculty of NYU, he was Assistant Professor of Health Policy at the University of California, San Francisco. Professor Rodwin earned both his PhD in City and Regional Planning and his MPH in Public Health from the University of California, Berkeley.



Affiliate Report: Osher Lifelong Learning Institute

For nearly a decade, WACMB has partnered with the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at CSUMB to promote the presentation, discussion, and study of international affairs. Larry Johnson is WACMB's liaison to OLLI, which is a dynamic learning community for adults age 50 and up. It offers a rich selection of curated courses (with no exams or grades) taught by CSUMB faculty and distinguished experts in their fields. Subjects are wide-ranging, including current events, literature, music, science, and many others. Fees vary by course, from none to \$70; a \$20 membership fee is required to participate in the full range of OLLI's offerings.

In addition to its freestanding discussion group (see the next column), WACMB typically offers a discussion group through OLLI. This fall, however, the WACMB Discussion Group at OLLI will take a break. Don't worry, though: it will reconvene in February 2022 for the Foreign Policy Association's *Great Decisions* program.

Even though the WACMB Discussion Group at OLLI will be on hiatus this fall, WACMB members are welcome to participate in other OLLI offerings. The fall 2021 semester will run from August 20 to December 10. The OLLI Fall Catalog will be available online on July 27, and registration opens on August 5 at 10 am.
